Welcome to Cub Scouting, part of the Boy Scouts of America (BSA). We are Pack 442 and we have approximately 100 Cub Scouts. Pack 442 consists of children from Lakeway Elementary and Serene Hills Elementary and Rough Hollow Elementary plus private schools. We welcome boys from Kindergarten through 5th grade. Our Pack is sponsored by The Lakeway Church.

We are glad you chose to join our Pack and look forward to watching your young Scout grow and develop as an individual, as a family member, as a citizen and as a leader in the community. Now let's have some fun!!!!

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Why Join Cub Scouting?

Your time is valuable. More than ever, today's families struggle to find time to spend together. Cub Scouting helps to support your family by providing ready-made opportunities for you and your child to do together.

Make memories with your child that will last a lifetime.

Your child needs to belong to a group of children their own age. Through this sense of belonging, they build self-esteem and learn to get along with others. As a parent, you want to be assured that the groups your child joins will teach values consistent with good citizenship, character development, physical and mental fitness, and leadership development. The Boy Scouts of America have been weaving these lifetime values into fun and educational activities since 1910.



The **Scouting** program has **four** specific **objectives**, commonly referred to as the “**Aims of Scouting**”. They are:

1. Character Development
2. Citizenship Training
3. Physical and Mental Fitness
4. Leadership Development

In addition to the “Aims of Scouting,” are the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

Our Motto is: “*Do Your Best*”

Scout Oath. On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the **Scout** Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

There are **12** principles a Boy **Scout** lives by which is actually considered the **Scout Law**. "A **Scout** is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent."

Scouting teaches family values and works to strengthen your relationship with your child. We all know that children don't join Cub Scouting just to get their character built. Children join Scouting because it is FUN!

Dens

Each scout starts as a member of a Den but is a part of a much larger network of scouts that will support their growth and development throughout their scouting adventures. Members who join Cub Scouts are assigned to a Den based upon their grade in school which defines which rank they will work towards. They need not have earned the previous rank in order to earn the next. Each of the ranks in Cub Scouting has its own requirements that are age appropriate. As a Cub Scout advances through the ranks, the requirements get more challenging, to match the new skills and abilities they have learned.

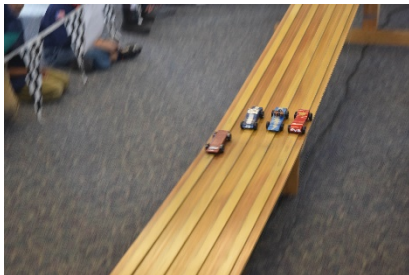
Den Meetings

The **Den typically meets monthly and the schedule is set by the Den Leader.** Den meeting activities are planned around the monthly requirement/theme and include games, handicrafts, hikes, volunteering and other outdoor fun. Each Den is led by a Den Leader and Assistant Den Leader. Den Leaders are trained parent volunteers. A Parent needs to attend with their Scout for the Lion, Tiger and Wolf Rank. **The Den Leader is your first point of contact for information and questions. Most of the information regarding the Den/Pack/Events etc....will come from your Den Leader.**

Pack

All Dens meet monthly as a Pack - All Cub Scout families are invited and encouraged to attend. Pack meetings have fun programs, games, skits, ceremonies and presentations of awards that the Scouts have earned that month.

The Pack meeting is the climax of the month's den meetings and activities. It gives the Dens something to look forward to and work toward. This is a chance to recognize the Scouts, their parents, and their leaders. The Cubmaster (aka 'Akela') is an adult volunteer who serves as master of ceremonies at all Pack activities. The Cubmaster will have an Assistant Cubmaster (aka 'Baloo') to help at these functions.



Pack Activities

In addition to its regular meetings, the Pack sponsors certain special projects. These include community projects (e.g., a Christmas Drive for the needy, Scouting for Food to help fill the local food bank), outdoor activities (e.g., family campouts twice a year, etc.), fund raising activities, and fun competitions (e.g., Pinewood Derby, RainGutter Regatta).



The Pack Committee (group of parent volunteers)

Much like other community organizations you or your child are a part of, the Pack is organized and ran by a group of dedicated volunteers. The pack committee supports the den leaders and Cubmaster of the pack so they can focus on working directly with the youth in the pack. Most of these leaders are parents of Scouts in the pack. All leaders and interested parents are encouraged to attend.

- The committee meets once a month.
- The committee plans pack meetings around the monthly theme/project/event.
- The committee plans events, organizes volunteers and has fun!
- The committee selects leaders, performs record keeping, manages pack finances, orders awards, maintains pack equipment, helps train leaders, and recognizes leaders.

To provide more localized support to scouting, councils create districts that group together Packs, Scouts BSA Troops, and Venturing Crews in a geographic area. Districts have a volunteer District Committee that provides support to units in the areas of membership, finance, and program. In addition, our Unit Commissioner is a volunteer who works directly with the Cubmaster, Committee Chair, and Committee to guide and support our Pack. Some of the support Bee Cave District offers our Pack are:

Pack Dues

How do I track what my Cub Scout is working on?

We are currently using Scout Book.



Scout Book is a **unit-management web application** that is a one-stop shop for parents and unit leaders to record and manage the Cub Scouts Scouting experience. It provides a way to track advancements, unit activities through a calendar as well to message the leaders in your Unit. You will be able to create a login to track your scout.

My Involvement as a Parent

Every Pack needs to have dedicated Adult volunteers to plan and run a great Pack program. Volunteers make sure that our Cub Scouts can enjoy and learn in the program.

In order to ensure we have enough volunteers; each family will help run a Pack Event.

Below is the breakdown by Rank and the Event you will be responsible for. Please note, you are in no way limited to just helping with one event. Help and good talent is always needed. Your Den leader will serve as the Chair for the event. You'll be required to attend a planning meeting and then help run the event. There will be plenty of guidance so don't feel overwhelmed.

- b. **Tiger Den – Fall Campout**
- c. **Wolf Den – Bike Rodeo**
- d. **Bear Den – Soap Box Derby**
- e. **Web I – Spring Campout**
- f. **Arrow of Light – Pinewood Derby**

Leadership Positions

Since the Pack is made up of parent volunteers, as child age out of the program, so do their parents. Therefore, we are always in succession planning mode. These are all very manageable positions that fit into almost anyone's schedule. If interested, please sign up NOW so we can get you trained.

DEN LEADER(S) and ASST DEN LEADER(S)- Leads the den at den meetings and monthly pack meeting. They are encouraged to attend the monthly Committee Meetings.

SECRETARY – Take minutes of the Pack meeting and record key items such as things needing follow-up or items for the history of the pack. Maintain an inventory of pack property. Handle correspondence for the pack.

TREASURER - Keeps all records for the pack. Including pack bank account, financial records, etc. Attends pack meetings, pack committee meetings.

NEW MEMBER CO-ORDINATORS – Responsible for recruiting campaigns and for year-round recruitment, growth and retention for the Pack. Ensures a smooth transition of new Scouts into the unit and orientation for new parents.

ADVANCEMENT CHAIR - Maintains advancement records. Orders and obtains all badges and insignia. Attends pack meetings and pack committee meetings.

GENERAL – Do you have a special skill or talent? Please complete our [Family Talent Survey](#). Check with your Den Leader or Cubmaster to see how you can help. The more help, the easier it is!

Learning About My Role - As a new parent, you may wonder how you learn about your role and what is expected of you. Don't Worry – there are lots of opportunities for training where you can get the basics and advanced training.

Youth Protection Training (online at www.My.Scouting.org) – Every parent needs to complete Youth Protection Training if you have not yet done so.

Position Training (online at www.My.Scouting.org) – whatever role you have, the basic trainings are available online on a self-paced e-learning. These trainings give you the introduction to your role to help orientate you.

Pack Communication



We know how important it is to get information out to the Pack in a timely manner so here are the ways we communicate. Email is our primary form of communication. Most of the information you receive will come from your Den Leader. Den Leaders are your direct contact for what is going on with the Pack. Uniform and Books

Look Sharp in your Uniform! The Cub Scout uniform identifies the organization within our community. We want our scouts to wear it properly and proudly. Our Pack has two approved uniforms for each member of the pack: 1.) the Cub Scout Uniform (sometimes called a “Class A”) used during Pack and Den meetings or whenever a scout is representing our Pack and 2.) Our Pack T-Shirt (sometimes called a “Class B”) uniform used during Pack and Den outings, such as hiking and camping (where the Cub Scouts are likely to get dirty).



You can purchase the Cub Scout Uniform (Class A) from the Scout Shop or online at: (<http://www.bsacac.org/shop>). The staff in the Scout Store can help you pick out the right items and below is a list by rank. The address is 12500 North IH I-35 Austin, TX 78753.

Note that Webelos may choose to continue to wear the Blue Cub Scout uniform or buy the Tan/Olive Boy Scout uniform. This choice is helpful for growing scouts or scouts with younger brothers. The Tan/Olive Boy Scout uniform is required when bridging to Scouts BSA.

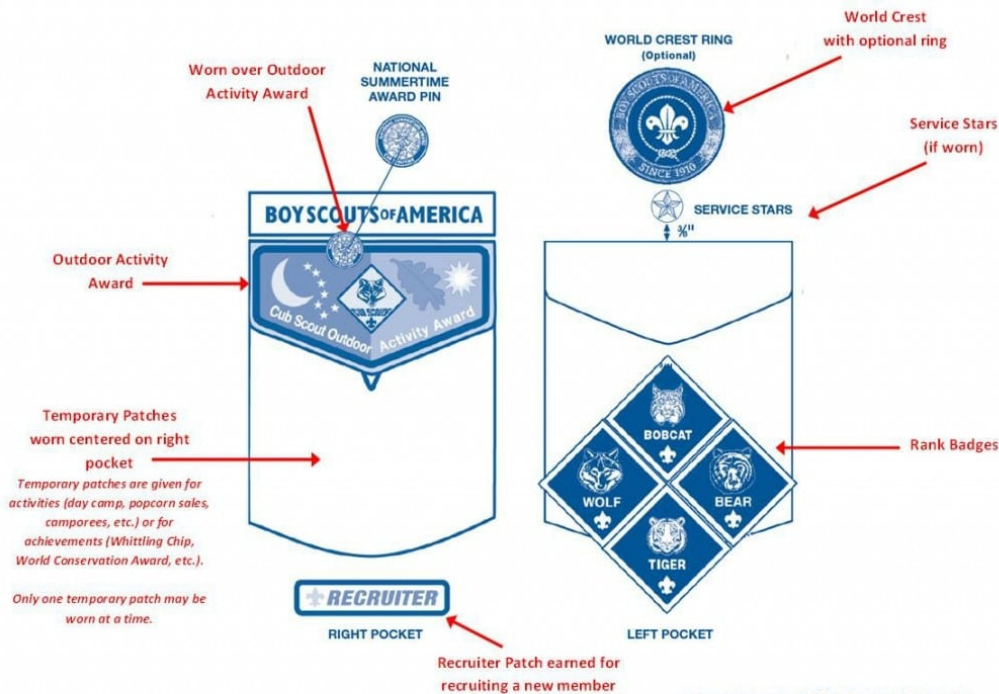
Sewing Uniform Patches

Cub Scout uniforms seem to have lots of patches! Kids love earning and displaying their rank advancement and showing off what activities they have done. Patches can be sewn on, either by you or by the Scout Shop, or can be glued on using Badge Magic (<https://scoutingmagazine.org/2015/08/sponsored-spend-less-time-sewing-and-more-time-scouting/>) Just be aware that Badge Magic can leave behind a residue if you remove / re-use the uniform with another Scout.
